FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...



The word "Advent" is derived from the Latin word Adventus, which translates to "coming." As scholar says "Advent is the season that asks us "to ponder all these things" in our heart. The season of Mary's 'yes;' Jo-

seph's dreams; John's cries in the wilderness. The season we ponder what it means that Christ came into this world as an obscure child and will return to judge all things," Traditionally, the Advent wreath is a circle of evergreen branches. Both the evergreen branches and the circular shape symbolize the passing of time and eternal life. The shape of the wreath, with no beginning or end, reflects the complete and endless love that Jesus has for his people. During the Advent season, his coming and the promise of eternal life in heaven is eagerly anticipated. The **first purple** candle is sometimes interpreted as the Candle of Hope. Purple is the primary color associated with Advent. Within the Catholic Church it symbolizes penance, preparation, and sacrifice. The **second purple candle** is seen as the Candle of Peace. Everyone reflects on their lives and works to become better versions of themselves in preparation for Jesus' coming. The third candle is Pink/Rose, called the Candle of Joy. It symbolizes anticipation and rejoicing. During the third week of Advent, everyone is filled with joy for the near arrival of Jesus on Christmas Day. The fourth candle is purple and called the Candle of Love. During this final week of Advent, there is rejoicing in the endless love that God has for everyone, which is made apparent in the birth of his son. May this season of Advent be a great time for all of us to prepare our hearts and minds to embrace true "Love" taking the form of flesh. Wishing you all a Blessed Advent Season.

ADVENT WATCHFULNESS

Are you attentive to Christ? Though this is a profoundly important question, there are many who may not even fully understand what this means. Yes, on the surface it is clear: Being "attentive" is being aware of the presence of our Lord in your life and in the world around you. So, are you attentive? Are you watchful? Are you looking, seeking, waiting, anticipating, and preparing for Christ to come? Though Jesus came to Earth over 2,000 years ago in the form of a little child, He continues to come to us today. And if you are not daily aware of His profound presence, then you may already be somewhat asleep, spiritually speaking. As we begin our Advent season, our Lord is speaking to you in the deepest depths of your soul. He is gently saying, "Wake up." "Listen." "Watch." He will not shout; He will whisper so that you must give Him your full attention. Do you see Him? Hear Him? Listen to Him? Understand Him? Do you know His voice? Or do the many voices all around you take you away from the deep, profound, and transforming truths He wishes to communicate to you? Reflect, on this First week of Advent the fact that God is speaking within the depths of your soul each and every day. He speaks to you in various ways. And what He says is all that really matters in life. Advent is a time, more than any, to renew your commitment to listen, to be attentive and to respond. Do not fall asleep. Wake up and diligently be attentive to the profound voice of our Lord.

From Bishop Terry R. LaValley... Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

I am writing to tell you about the upcoming 2023 collection for the Retirement Fund for Religious. This annual appeal assists nearly 25,000 elderly sisters, brothers and religious order priests nationwide. I am grateful for the significant influence that women and men religious, both past and present, have had on my own spiritual journey. FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...



On December 9, 1531, Saint Juan Diego, an Indian convert to the faith, was walking to a nearby village so that he could attend Mass. On his way, a woman appeared to him amidst the sound of celestial music. She announced to him: "I am your merciful Mother,

to you and to all mankind who love me and trust in me and invoke my help. Therefore, go to the dwelling of the Bishop in Mexico City and say that the Virgin Mary sent you to make known to him her great desire". Though Juan Diego did not accomplish this at first, he eventually followed the instruction of the Virgin of Guadalupe in subsequent apparitions and brought fresh roses from the mountain top to the bishop as a sign that the Virgin wanted a shrine built there. Roses did not usually grow that time of year, so this was clearly a miraculous sign. Upon arriving at the bishop's residence, Juan Diego opened his cloak (tilma) carrying the roses so as to pour them out onto the floor before the bishop. When he did so, the Virgin of Guadalupe appeared, miraculously, upon the threads of this cloak. The cloak is still visible to all who wish to see it at the shrine in Mexico City. And what is amazing, scientifically speaking, is that the image is not painted, rather, each and every thread has changed color so as to create this holy image. Furthermore, the cloak is made of a cactus plant that normally disintegrates within ten years. Today, the cloak is almost five hundred years old, and it is as fresh and vibrant as ever. The Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe (December 12th) is not simply seen as a cultural, historical, or miraculous phenomenon. Rather, it must be seen as a glorious invitation from the Queen of Heaven to accept her as our mother.

We want attention, recognition, and praise. We often struggle with this tendency because self-elevation has a way of making us feel important. And such a "feeling" feels good, to an extent. But what our fallen human nature often fails to recognize is that humility is one of the greatest attributes we can have and is, by far, the greatest source of greatness in life. What could be greater than the act of pointing others to be the Savior of the World? What could be greater than helping others to discover their purpose in life by coming to know Christ Jesus as their Lord and Savior? What could be greater than exhorting others to a life of selfless surrender to the one and only God of mercy? 7 STEPS TO BRING PEOPLE BACK TO CHURCH

4. Engage in a conversation and listen. The first thing vou want to do when you are looking at trying to bring someone back to the faith is to just ask a really great question like "Hey, can I ask you something. I wonder if you'd be willing to talk about something spiritual with me. I know you have mixed relationships with the Church, and I'd love to just hear why you're no longer with us. I just want to hear." And then listen. Do nothing but listen, attentively listen. Look at them in the eye, nod your head, and absorb like a sponge everything they say and don't respond with objections. Because the reason that they're giving is the valid reason of why they subjectively feel the Church has failed them. Fill up the greatest instrument of salvation and peace and joy and mercy in the world. This is their experience of why they believe that the Church that Jesus Christ founded has hurt them or has neglected them or hasn't met their needs or hasn't been with them. And so, you just have to listen and that might be the end of the conversation that day. "I really appreciate you sharing with me those feelings, those thoughts, I'll be praying for you or If you wish I could ask the Pastor (of the particular Church) to reach out to you and help you the ways you wish to be helped" One never knows. 

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK...



For much of the Church's history, the Third Sunday of Advent is known as "Gaudete" Sunday. The traditions surrounding this Sunday go back as far as the fourth or fifth century. as does the season of Advent itself. Advent, our preparation for Christmas, was originally a forty-day penitential

season like Lent. In fact, since it used to begin on 12 November (just after the Memorial of St. Martin of Tours), it was called "St Martin's Lent." "Gaudete Sunday" was the Advent counterpart to "Laetare Sunday," which marks the mid-point in Lent. On Gaudete Sunday, the season of Advent shifts its focus. For the first two weeks of Advent, the focus can be summed up in the phrase, "The Lord is coming." But beginning with Gaudete Sunday, the summary might be, "The Lord is near." This shift is marked by a lighter mood and a heightened sense of joyous anticipation. Liturgically, the colors lighten as well. The word "Gaudete" is Latin for "Rejoice." This celebration is a reminder that God who loves us is still in charge and that we await His coming not with fear but with tremendous joy. We read in the Letter of St Paul to the Ephesians, which reflects this joy: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again, I will say, Rejoice. Let all men know your forbearance. The Lord is at hand. Have no anxiety about anything but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which passes all understanding, will keep your hearts and vour minds in Christ Jesus.

John 1:26-27 These are words of true humility and wisdom. John the Baptist had quite a following. Many were coming to him to be baptized, and he was gaining much notoriety. But his notoriety did not go to his head. Instead, he understood his role of preparing the way for "the one who is coming." He understood that he needed to decrease as Jesus began His public ministry. And, thus, he humbly points others to Jesus. It's also important to note that John said to the Pharisees that they "do not recognize" the one who is coming after him. In other words, those who are filled with pride and self-righteousness are blind to the truth. They cannot see beyond themselves, which is an incredible lack of wisdom. Reflect, this Third week of Advent, upon your calling to imitate these virtues of St. John the Baptist. Do you see your duty in life as one that is singularly focused upon putting your eyes on Christ and pointing others to Him? Do you humbly recognize that it is Jesus Who must increase and that you are nothing more than his unworthy servant? If you can seek to serve the will of God with complete humility, you also will be truly wise. And like through John, many will come to know Christ because of your holy service.

5. Move the dialogue further. To move the dialogue down the road, to begin to ask and begin to offer answers to their longings so someone might say "I just didn't feel like I was spiritually fed." So, then share with them the gift and beauty of the Eucharist. To listen to what they said, when they said, "I felt like everybody was a hypocrite," and then to talk about the true compassion, mercy, and love that is present within the Church. They said that they were hurt by someone. We must address that hurt but then speak of the great heroes that are in the faith. So, this fifth step is the challenging step: it's to move the dialogue further by truly listening but then applying the truth to those areas of hurt in their heart. 6. Invite them to an event. It might be a parish picnic, a parish workshop, it might be a social of some sort. It might be just a catechetical talk taking place in your parish. It might be saying "Hey, why don't you come to adoration of the Blessed Sacrament with me?" The reason why sometimes the best thing to not do is to invite them back to Mass is that sometimes Mass is the place where it can seem really uninviting. You don't know when to stand. You don't know when to sit. You don't know the words. You don't know the gestures. And then all of a sudden you feel like everyone is looking at you. So, sometimes it's great to invite them to a real introductory experience and in that introductory experience they realize there's a community, that there's hope, there's vitality. THOUGHTS ON EVANGELIZATION
